We hope that the children have established a strong sense of connection with their 2019 teachers and classmates and that they also will be able to integrate their learning from their Term One into all aspects of their learning for the remainder of the year. It is important that they have or develop a growth mindset and that they approach all school work with a strong sense of self belief and belonging. We believe that the more exposure our students have to concepts such as these, the greater chance they will have of being successful adults in the future. We will continue to emphasise the dispositions associated with having a growth mindset and to ensure students have high expectations of themselves. We are also excited about continuing our “New Pedagogies for Deep Learning” work through the global research project we are involved with. Our Visible Learning approach is strongly embedded in the school and it has been exciting to undertake work with others from across the globe, around ways to deepen student learning through using the NPDL planning framework based on new pedagogies, learning partnerships, leveraging digital and learning environments. We hope to offer parents from both primary schools an opportunity to learn more about this project later in the year, through a combined NPDL Learning Partnership Evening.

As this is the final newsletter for this term, it is important to acknowledge the awesome contribution everyone has made to really “make a difference” for the children this term. 

SCHOOL SELF REVIEW TOPIC – HEALTH & SAFETY NAG 5 LOCK DOWN

We have recently reviewed our evacuation and lock down processes. Yesterday the school went into lock down and we debriefed this process at our staff meeting held after school. We would appreciate if you could read through our revised procedures for lock down and we welcome any feedback. **In particular, please check through the section for parents, as it is important you know what will happen if we go into lock down and how we will communicate important information to you. Please also note the new expectation that if you have signed your child out from school during the day for any reason, you are required to accompany them to the office when returning their blue slip. We do not want any child to be dropped off outside school and then be unaccompanied when they find the school office locked because of a lock down.**

Lock Down

- Lock Down bell (5 rings of the school bell) signals that students are required to move quickly back to their own rooms when they hear the signal. Older students are to encourage younger students to go back to their rooms by calling out “go to your room now”.
- Junior Duty Teacher to move through sandpit, Junior Playground & playhut areas on their way back to class. Senior Duty Teacher to check Junction Suite on their way to their classroom, unless this space is being used as a classroom.
- Teachers are to lock all classroom doors, shut windows, turn off lights and pull down blinds. Some teachers have additional external doors to lock and signs to put on doors to inform people who may arrive at school that the school is under lock-down. These additional doors include - main doors from street to Block B (H3), back door (H2) and front door nearest Admin Block (H6). Rms1 & 2 are responsible for their normal locking procedure, but if

they are not present the Office Staff will do this. School Administrator or TA to check all doors in Administration Area

- Children are expected to enter the buildings as quickly as possible and then wait quietly in their classrooms for their teacher and roll call.
- Once all children have been accounted for, teachers will email the office (admin@cromprimary.school.nz) to notify office staff that all children have been accounted for. If a student is unaccounted for, teachers should record their name on the email being sent to the office and this will be followed up by office team. Teachers also to advise parents of Lock Down using Seesaw.
- After roll call & notifying parents, teachers will carry on with a quiet activity – reading a story, a game, art computers etc. Students may only go to the toilet if it is urgent, seat small children on the floor. Children to be kept away from windows and doors. Keep children calm by talking softly, explaining what is happening in the simplest way, be reassuring.
- Any additional contact required with office should be done via email.
- Principal moves to Junior Block and will lock any external doors if teachers are off site during break times. Principal to cover any unsupervised classes in Junior Block and Office Staff will cover any unsupervised in Administration Block. If required Rooms 8/9 can cover each other.
- An adult will personally visit rooms to indicate when the lock down is over.

Communicating with Parents

- Parents will be notified by email, Seesaw & Facebook when the school is under lockdown. They will also be notified in the same way when the lock down is over and that students may be collected if it is in out-of-school hours.
- No parents will be given access to any school buildings during a lock down & no external phone calls will be taken except for emergency service contacts.
- Parents must accompany children to the office with their blue slips when returning them to school during the day. This will avoid children being dropped off outside the grounds and finding the school in lock down when they get to the office.

Office Staff

- Lock administration area doors including the staffroom, pull down any blinds, put up “Lock Down” signs on external doors and turn lights off.
- Advise parents of the Lock Down via email & Facebook.
- Check the School Leave Slip Book for any students who are currently signed out against the names of “unaccounted for students” sent via email from class teachers. Follow up with these parents once all of the above actions have been taken.
- Check emails regularly for any emergency emails & communication from classrooms.

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BOARD ELECTIONS - HAVE YOU EVER THOUGHT ABOUT BECOMING A SCHOOL TRUSTEE?

The Board are preparing for the upcoming Triennial BoT elections to be held on the **7 June 2019**. Elections are held every three years and I urge the Cromwell Primary School community to consider the important role of the Board of Trustees. to help shape and support the education of their children.

I have found my time on the BOT very rewarding and a great chance to use my strategic management skills to help our kids. I wanted to be part of making a positive difference and setting clear direction for the learning and achievement of children at Cromwell Primary School. Being an active leader in our school and part of a highly professional and effective team has been a great experience.

What does the BOT do?

The BOT is responsible for the governance of the school. The board is the employer of all staff and is responsible for setting the school's strategic direction and targets in consultation with parents, staff and students. We monitor and evaluate how well we do against these targets. The Board is also responsible for overseeing the management of personnel, curriculum, property, finance and administration. We ensure that our school provides a safe environment and quality education for all of our students. We want every child to achieve their potential at CPS.

Who are we looking for?

We need a range of skills, experiences and backgrounds on our BOT to ensure our decisions are balanced, considered and have the best possible outcomes for our children. Being a good communicator with an enquiring mind and having the ability to ask challenging questions certainly helps. There are specific skills that are helpful to our Board including financial skills, experience with property, communications or employment.

Parents, caregivers and people from the wider community can be elected to our school board. Normally our school has five parent elected representatives and one staff elected representative. The principal is also a member of the board.

Training and support

The Korari Programme is available for anyone interested in finding out about standing for the school board elections and having a say in the education of their children. Resources available are:

- **Korari:** a programme (workshop) that provides you with governance training to help you understand the role of school boards of trustees. Workshops for Korari will be held in March/April this year. Please see poster in Community Notices section.
- **Korari form:** NZSTA will support anyone who advises us they are interested in becoming a trustee, by way of the workshops but also providing access to their Learning Management System where online modules re. school governance, student achievement etc. can be completed. (school office)
- **Community member guide to the role of the board of trustees:** This explains a lot of commonly asked questions and information about becoming a trustee.

FINANCES

We are looking to apply for funding for any students who require financial assistance with the cost of the school skiing programme that will be held in the third term of this year. The skiing programme is for Years 4-6 students. If the cost of the ski programme is a contributing factor for your children not participating in this programme, please contact Tegan or Wendy by the 10th April as the application needs to be in by the 12th April. The cost of the programme is usually between \$150-\$300 depending on what is required.

AFTER-SCHOOL CARE PROGRAMME

The Afterschool Care Programme is a service that is provided by Cromwell Primary School in a response to a lack of Afterschool Services in our community. It is separate to the core services provided by the school and is funded solely by the fees paid by the caregivers using the service. We receive no funding from the Ministry of Education or any other sources.

To ensure this service remains viable, casual users of the service are required to pay on the day of the booking (or by the end of the week if there are a number of bookings in the week). No invoice will be issued, unless payment is overdue. For users who have permanent bookings, invoices will be issued monthly and are required to be paid within 7 days.

These fees are used to pay the wages of the supervisors, so any delay in payment compromises the ability of the programme to continue.

If payment is overdue, we will follow this up with a phone call. To avoid any embarrassment, please pay by the due date.

We also ask that you pick your children up by 5:30 at the very latest as our supervisors have other commitments and it can cause significant inconvenience if they have to wait for caregivers who are late picking up their children. We will be charging a late pick up fee for anyone who is consistently late picking up their child/children and it may result in their booking being cancelled.
